African Drum Factsheet

DJEMBE

- The Djembe is the drum of the Mandinka people of West Africa, and its origins dates back to the Mali Empire of the 12th century.
- It is a goblet shaped drum and is carved in one single piece from a hollowed out tree
- The drum is covered with goat skin and tied down in a pattern called a Mali Weave
- Played with bare hands, the primary notes are bass, tone and slap

DJUN-DJUN

- Also known as Dunun or Doundoun, these drums are covered with cow skin
- Often several djun-djuns are grouped together and played with a wooden stick
- Three sizes of drum are named kenkeni (smallest), sangban (medium) and dundunba (largest)

ADINKRA

Adinkra symbols were developed by the Ashanti people of West Africa and originate from the 17th century. Examples carved on the drums include:



ADINKRAHENE

"Chief of the adinkra symbols" symbol of greatness and leadership



MPATAPO

"knot of reconciliation" symbol of reconciliation and peacemaking



AKOMA

"the heart" symbol of patience and tolerance



GYE NYAME

"except for God" symbol of the supremacy of God



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
